GUIDE FOR SFACC RIDE LEADERS



The ride leader is one of the most critical roles in the club, tasked with keeping the group safe as well as leading a great ride. Here are some tips and hints for leading a ride safely and effectively.

BEFORE THE RIDE

- Make sure you are physically fit to lead with a roadworthy bike and appropriate clothing
- Consider extras to bring as ride leader (e.g. small first aid kit)
- Create a good quality route to match group expectations
- Book any café stop.
- Let your group know what to expect (speed, distance, terrain, elevation etc)
- Publish start location and time to the group (advise if different to Milestone)

- Share the route (if a planning tool is used e.g. RWGPS, Strava etc.) in advance via email, social media or the SFACC forum
- If new riders are coming, confirm their suitability for the ride and ask if there are any issues the leader needs to be aware of
- If you need a colleague to act as back-marker or leader of a second group, agree how you will share responsibilities
- Check the weather forecast. If it is icy, then cancel the ride and inform others by your usual contact medium

AT THE START OF THE RIDE, ON THE DAY:

- Turn up 10 mins early to welcome riders, particularly new riders
- Ensure that everyone is introduced to each other
- Welcome new riders and ensure they understand how the group ride will work
- Take a register of who is riding (a photo will do)
- Any rider issues? (e.g. anyone planning to peel off? Any health issues you need to be aware of?)
- Have all your riders prepared? (e.g. got the right kit, and a roadworthy bike? water? emergency snack bar? carrying spares e.g. inner tubes? ICE cards?)

- Check who knows the route (at minimum, your back marker or second-leader) and has loaded it on to their GPS or phone
- Outline the route, flagging any tricky sections (difficult junctions, busy main roads, steep descents)
- Check the weather forecast again and adjust route as necessary (ice, flooding etc.)
- Agree expectations with the group (e.g. no one will be dropped, waiting at hill tops and junctions.)

DURING THE RIDE:

- Give clear warnings as hazards emerge, advising group of challenging areas ahead (e.g. pot holes, gravel, horses, main roads)
- Where possible ensure that you can always see your back marker / second leader – and don't drop anyone unless agreed otherwise)
- Use calls effectively, encouraging the whole group to relay calls
- Ensure your group respects the rights of other road users – riders must not knowingly contravene the Highway Code
- Take actions to minimise risks to the group. At times this may mean leading from the back, or watching riders through a junction and then catching up
- In the event of an incident, take control and delegate tasks, e.g. comfort rider / phone for ambulance, alert other road users and advise other riders to wait in a safe place. If a third party is involved, be prepared to note details etc. for a subsequent incident report.
